1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Introduction: Swahid Peoli Phukan College, Namti, the lone Higher Educational Institute in the greater Namti region of Sivasagar district, was established in 1970 by a group of visionary intellectuals and was named after the first Assamese Martyr Peoli Phukan, who sacrificed his life for the country's freedom. The college was brought under UGC recognition of 2f on 29-12-1988 (UGC letter No. F.8-35/88 CPP-I) and 12 B on 20-07-2003 (UGC letter No. F.8-243/2003 CPP-I). At present the college is affiliated to Dibrugarh University and runs UG programmes in two streams- Arts & Science (self-financed). Besides these, the college offers 8 university approved Add on courses and functions as Study Centre of DDE, Dibrugarh University and KKH State Open University offering both UG and PG programmes.

During the 52 years long history of dedicated service towards dissemination of knowledge, the college has made impactful contribution towards producing enlightened human resource, spreading awareness in the neighbourhood, creating avenues for imparting higher education in the region, promoting human values and thereby adding to the cause of uplifting the community and the nation as a whole. In these eventful years, the college has carved a niche for itself by consistently maintaining a conducive environment for academic excellence and social well-being. In the mean time, the college has successfully undergone 2 cycles of NAAC accreditation, fisrtly in 2004 and secondly in 2015, obtaining Grade B in both these cycles. Till date the college has participated in NIRF process, AISHE Survey, NFCH, MGNCRE, IIC under MoE activities etc. on regular basis. Besides these, the college has been able to make landmark achievements by winning the District Green Champion Award in 2021, Best UG College Award for Academic Excellence in 2022.

The college has already established itself as a premier UG College of Assam by maintaining sound record of students' performance in curricular & co-curricular activities, progression & placement, contributing significantly towards social uplift, consistently augmenting its infrastructure in an IT-friendly & eco-friendly way, offering new opportunities for the aspirants through NSS & NCC, working in the field of research & extension and initiating preparation for NEP implementation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- SPP College, Namti considers effective curricular planning and delivery as the key determinant to its success as a Higher Educational Institution. In realization of the same, the college has developed its own mechanism for ensuring optimum level of effectiveness in planning and delivery of curriculum. Emphasis is always laid on adhering to the University prescribed curriculum & detail academic schedule, preparing college academic calendar, a master routine and departmental routines with allotment of classes, designing framework for transparent Continuous Internal Evaluation, encouraging adequate use of ICT. The College internal committees like IQAC, Academic Committee, Body of HoDs, Calendar Preparation Committee, Routine Committee, Examination Committee etc. are entrusted to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum. The institutional in-built mechanism further ensures effectiveness of the entire process through close monitoring, rigorous assessment, timely review and necessary follow up actions.
- To contribute towards holistic development of the students, SPP college is running a total of eight (8) university approved skill & value-based courses, which the students can study parallelly to their UG programmes. More than 200 students have benefitted from these courses during the last five years. The students have benefitted from the College Cultural Society and the Yoga Centre in terms of inculcating knowledge, skill and value.
- The regular courses offered in the college provide the students with good opportunity to orient themselves with cross cutting issues like gender, human values, environment, professional ethics, tolerance etc. On the other hand, the conducive institutional ambience, NSS, NCC and other communitty-related extension activities provide them a platform to be acquainted with essential issues.
- The college encourages experiential learning through project work, study tour, industrial visit, community visit, role play etc. and during the period from 2017-18 to 2021-22, a total of 78 students

- have participated in such learning activities.
- The college has a robust mechanism for obtaining feedback from students, alumni, teachers, employers and guardians by using both online and offline modes. These feedbacks are analyzed and follow up actions are taken accordingly. The same is later discussed in the Governing Body and relevant suggestions or recommendations are communicated to the persons concerned.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The college has its own policy for enrolling students, which thrusts on the key areas like merit, inclusion, equity, compliance with government policy, scholarship/freeship opportunity and the students' future prospect.
- To encourage and escalate research & research-oriented activities, the college framed its Research Policy in 2021 and formed the College Research & Development Cell in the same year. Accordingly, some significant development has been made so far in terms of creating a pro-research ambience.
- The college has a vibrant, energised and well-qualfied faculty strength in which a balanced combination of youth and experience is clearly visible. This is evident from the quality-statistics of the faculty members with 17 years (approx) of average experience, 17 nos. of Ph.D. holders, 15 nos. of M.Phil. holders and 20 nos. having NET/SLET.
- The college encourages exclusive use of learner-centric inclusive Pedagogy equipped with 12 ICT-enabled class-rooms, 2 Conference Halls, 4 Projectors and some online platforms. The teaching-learning process of the college proves student-friendly, interactive, participatory, experiential, objective and result-giving. The teachers adopt different methods for slow & advanced learners such as arrangement of Remedial & Tutorial classes, Counselling, Home assignment, Class-room discussion, Quizzing, motivation towards extensive study & research-oriented activities.
- To keep the CIE fair, objective, transparent and error-free, SPP College has evolved its robust mechanism in conformity with the University-prescribed guidelines. Besides strictly adhering to the university guidelines, the college takes its own initiative of constituting Academic Committee, Examination Committees separately for Internal & External Examinations etc. for smooth and error-free completion of the CIE process.
- The college fraternity is clear about the Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of all the programmes offered and the courses taught in the college. These are communicated to the students in due course of time by using accessible platforms like the College website, Whatsapp Groups, Departmental Syllabus, general Orientation & Class-room Discussion.
- The college has maintained a consistently good record of pass percentage in the final examinations in the last five years (@ average 79.47%).
- To make the institutional practices more student-friendly, the college regularly undertakes SSS (both online and offline).

Research, Innovations and Extension

Performance in Research, Innovations and Extension defines the qualitative excellence of an HEI.

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Defining institutional objective, SPP College has adopted certain effective measures and frames appropriate policies such as:

- Framing of a Research Policy and constitution of Research & Development Cell to streamline research based innovative practices.
- Completion of a Major Research Project by Dr. Tanuja Bora as Chief Investigator on "Ram Katha Tradition in Assam: A Potent Force of Integration" funded by the ICSSR in 2017-18 (Research Grant of 14 lacs).
- Integrated policy of Appreciating and Honouring achievers in innovation, research, creation and dissemination of knowledge.
- College policy of providing seedmoney for students' research project to encourage the students to undertake research activities. Under this scheme, the college granted Rs. 6000/- to 7 departments in 2021-2022.
- Conducting of a good number of seminars, workshops and talk/awareness programmes on research methodology, intellectual property rights and entrepreneurship development to create research-oriented ambience.
- Institutional policy of providing financial assistance to stakeholders to participate in international/national seminars, workshop and symposia, under which 38 nos. of teachers were benefitted during the period from 2017-18 to 2021-22.
- The college has made its effort to develop a conducive Ecosystem for Innovation and Knowledge creation & transfer. As part of this effort, the college has adopted multiple measures like:

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- Infrastructure and Learning Resources: Since inception, the College has been trying its level best to augment its infrastructure and enrich the learning resources to suffice to the learners' needs. At present, the college has at its possession 57 bigha 2 katha of land in three different locations. In the existing premises, there is total13063.6 square metre built up area, which provides adequate provision for administrative set up and learning resources with 32 class rooms out of which 12 are ICT enabled, 6 laboratories, 2 Seminar Halls, 1 Auditorium, 1 Gymnasium Hall, 1 Central Library, 1 Student Union Office, separate Common Room for Boys & Girls, 1 Canteen, 1 Play School, 1 Yoga Centre. So far the class rooms are concerned, 12 class rooms are ICT enabled with installation of ICT devices like Smart TV & Projectors.
- During the period from 2017-18 to 2021-22, the college incurred total expenditure of Rs. 236.95 Lacs for infrastructure augmentation and Rs. 263.05 Lacs for maintenance of physical & academic facilities. In this regard, the college mobilized fund not only from government agencies, but also from non-govt. agencies & individuals.
- The college library contains 26797 nos. of text & reference books and has the subscription of 11 periodicals and 7 News Papers at present. The Library is automated with installation of KOHA, ILMS & OPAC. Capitalizing on the online platforms, the Library now facilitates the users for having easy access to 195809 e-books, 3224 e-journals and the College Digital repository.
- The College is keen to strengthen and update IT infrastructure as an integral part of its commitment towards providing quality education. Continuous efforts have been made to attain the same through:
- Broad Band Connection with 100+ MBPS
- Procurement and Installation of 12 Smart TVs and 4 Projectors for class room use during the last five years
- Development of 1 Smart Class Room cum Computer Lab in 2019
- Initiating Online Administrative & Academic activities
- Updating college website in 2020 and re-designing it in 2021 to meet the rising demand
- Providing 36 nos. of Computer for students' use, thereby maintaing the computer-student ratio of 1: 13.97.

Student Support and Progression

SPP College deems it the topmost priority to excel in the area of student support and progression. The college endeavours to attain this goal by strategically working in the key areas of students' Scholarship & Freeship, Capacity Building, Redressal of Grievances, Placement & Progression, performance in different activities, participation in Sports, Cultural and other Extension activities and multi-level alumni engagement and

- For Capacity Building & Skill enhancement of the students, the college has introduced some additional courses like Yoga Vidya, Soft Skill Development, Assamese DTP & Web Designing, Disaster Management, Mass Communication, Peace and Conflict Study, North East studies, Mushroom Cultivation. The college provides further opportunity through NSS, NCC, Cultural Society, Gymnasium etc. Besides these, the college conducted 57 programmes on soft skill, language & communicative skill, life skill, ICT & Computing Skill and employability enhancement through which 2886 students benefitted during the period from 2017-18 to 2021-22:
- The College Career Counselling Cell is intensely involved in students' progression, placement and employment opportunities, which conducted 10 nos. of such programmes in the last 5 years. The following table shows the record of placement & progression of the passed out students:

- The college internal committees like Internal Complaint Committee, Students' Welfare Committee, Antiragging Cell & RTI Cell primarily look into the matters related to redressal of students' grievances.
- 27 students have qualified in the State/National level examinations like TET, CTET, NET, SLET & Entry into Service.
- 34 nos. of students could win awards/prizes for outstanding performance in international/national/state/university level competitions.
- Students' participation in Sports/Culture/Extension activities was encouraging.
- The college has one registered Alumni Association (RS/SIVA/256/G/09 of 2022-23) and the alumni contribute both academically & financially. During last five years, college alumni contributed Rs. 652714/- in cash & kind.

Governance, Leadership and Management

• The institutional policy for Governance, Leadership and Management has been designed in accordance

- The college has made significant improvement upon the area of e-governance in the last five years. As of now, e-governance has been introduced in most of the activities of Administration, Finance & Accounts, Admission and Examination.
- SPP College is prone to ensure the welfare of every stakeholder and it is actualized through SPP College Employees Cooperative Society, First Aid & Health Care Policy, Health Care Facility, Divyagnajan Policy, Leave Policy, Gymnasium facility at subsidized rate, parking space, institutional e-mail IDs for making official communications, Recreational Facility, Maintenance of Service Book to ensure justice and equality opportunity.
- To encourrage the faculty members for participating in academic programmes, the College has evolved its own policy of providing financial support. In the last five years total 38 nos. of teachers benefitted under this policy.
- During the period from 2017-18 to 2021-22, 79 faculty members participated in various FDPs like Refresher Course, Orientation programme, Short Term Course, Short Term Training & Workshop.
- The college has a transparent policy for mobilization and utilization of resource. The prime sources of fund mobilization are UGC, RUSA, Govt. of Assam, ICSSR, MP & MLA Fund, SPP CECS, Admission, Examination fees, Canteen Fee, Hostel Fees, Brochure distribution, Donations, Bank Interest, Alumni Contribution, Bid Charges, Auction of damaged/unusable items, Gymnasium etc.
- Optimal utilization of resources is ensured through regular internal/ external audit, Social Audit and assessment of utilization by competent bodies.
- IQAC has made impactful contribution towards quality sustenance in teaching, learning, research and extension by taking initiatives for completing feedback process, collaborative practices, NIRF participation, quality audit by various competent agencies.

- Promoting Gender Equity is an institutional thrust area and the college ensures the same by strategically adopting an effective mechanism which includes conducting of Gender Audit, constitution of Internal Complaints Committee for instant redressal of gender sensitive issues, formation of College Women Cell, insisting on the inclusion of female representative in all levels of institutional bodies and promoting a zero-discrimination atmosphere. On the other hand, the college tries to comply with gender sensitivity by providing separate Girls Common Room with essential amenities, installing CC Camera, Generator & Inverter, providing Hostel facilities for girl students, installing a Vending Machine in the Girls' Common room, distributing free sanitary napkin and making it compulsory to appoint lady Teacher as Guide in all excursions, field trips & study tours which include girls students.
- Besides observing the regular commemorative and other relevant days, the college conducted 5 quality

seminars/webinar/talk and convened ACTA Women Convention in the last five years.

- Commitment of the college towards environmental responsibility is reflected well in the practices like framing the Green Policy, switching to increasing use of Alternative Energy, sensitizing towards economic consumption of power, developing effective mechanism for Waste Management, initiating device for Water conservation, Green Campus initiatives and augmenting a Disable-friendly Environment.
- The college successfully conducted some quality audits such as Green Audit, Energy Audit and carried out reasonable nos. of environment-related outreach programmes.
- The college exclusively promotes an Inclusive Environment through its well-defined mechanism, which includes the College Code of Conduct, adherence to Reservation Policy, observation of Communal Harmony Week, display of ethnic cultures in institutional programmes, observation of constitution Day, National Voters' Day, International Women's Day, Teachers' Day, organization of Blood Donation Camp, conducting Cleanliness & Plantation Drive

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary: Being an affiliated Under Graduate college, SPP College has limited autonomy and has to adhere to the regulations of the parent University & other competent bodies. As such, the college is yet to adopt a comprehensive multi-disciplinary/inter-disciplinary approach. But keeping in mind the urge of the hour and institutional preparedness for implementing NEP, the college has initiated certain effective measures such as: 1. Introduction of Science Stream in the UG level. 2. Introduction of subjects like Rural Development, Statistics, Environmental Sciences, NSS etc. and appointment of faculty at institution's own initiative. 3. Introduction of CBCS in 2019 in the UG level in

compliance with the DU regulation 4. Introduction of 8 nos. of Add-on Courses approved by Dibrugarh University namely......All these courses are skillbased and inter-disciplinary in nature. 5. Institutional as well as individual initiative for undergoing short term training programme/ workshop on areas of multidisciplinary or inter-disciplinary approach such as soft-skill and presentation skill (Dr. Biman Ch. Das, 2020), International Multidisciplinary Conference on Geography, Environment & Sustainable Environment (Dr. S.Z. Ahmed, 2021), RC on Inter-disciplinary Studies and Research (Beejata Das, 2022), FDP on Inclusive, Innovative & Value Education and NEP (UK Hazarika, Achyut Borah, BC Borah, BC Das, R. Baruah, 2022) 6. Initiative for developing expertise through training or orientation as a part of which the faculty members have attended various programmes on NEP implementation such as Dr. Biman Ch. Borah attended training programme and Achyut Borah in 2022. 7. Emphasis on expanding multi-disciplinary approach as envisioned in the Institutional Development Plan.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

2. ABC: SPP College, Namti is highly appreciative of the NEP provision of introducing ABC, as it proves beneficial for academic flexibility, students' credit storage and credit transfer. Due to the non-existent of the same provision within the purview of Dibrugarh University UG Curriculum at present, the college has not yet developed any full-fledged mechanism of ABC. But the college has already taken initiative in this line by sensitizing the students towards the importance of getting registered in ABC & NAD for their future use. Besides this, efforts have further been made to aware the faculty members of the efficacy of the same so that the college can keep itself ready beforehand for effectively implementing NEP. It is worth mentioning that Dr. Mukul Borah, Assistant Professor, Department of Statistics & Coordinator, SPP College Study Centre of KKHSOU has developed expertise on handling ABC-related matters as he has done it for the ODL learners under KKHSOU.

3. Skill development:

Equipping the young generation with required skills and thereby producing skilled man power has become an integral part of the collective responsibility of an HEI and in realization of the same, SPP college has

already initiated its strategic measures. The following measures reflect the institutional intent of integrating skill development in its curriculum as a compulsory, core or additional course: 1. Introduction of 8 new university approved Add on courses were introduced in 2022, which are either skill-based or value-base in nature. . 2. Due capitalization on the scope provided in the prescribed syllabi of certain Courses by extending opportunity for the learners to skill themselves through experiential as well experimental learning like conducting survey, undertaking project work/field study/educational tour and preparing report on that 3. Giving exposure to the students by motivating them for role-play both inside and outside the class room. 4. By making extensive use of ICT. 5. Creating expertise through Teachers' participation in STC and STT on Soft skill, Life Skill, Computing Skill etc. 6. Two senior faculty members of the college Dr. Nilakshi Puhkan Borgohain and Dr. Tanuja Bora had obtained Ph.D. on areas related to Performing Art and rendered service as Resource Person at the Centre of Performing Art, Dibrugarh University. 7. The college was registered under National Skill Development Corporation, Govt. of India in 2021 for introducing Skill-based Courses under the Scheme of PM Koushal Vikash Yojana. Future Plan: 1. Introduction of new skill-based courses on the demanding areas like tea-management, agar-wood, beautician, knitting & designing, nursery etc. It is expected that implementation of NEP shall open up new avenue for the college to work extensively towards skill development.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

SPP College, Namti is prone to work towards appropriately integrating Indian Knowledge System in its curriculum. As of now, it is a privilege that the UG Courses prescribed by Dibrugarh University have incorporated the essence of Indian Knowledge System to a significant extent. Besides focusing on appropriate delivery of the curriculum, the college has also taken the onus of addressing this area by: 1. Introducing Add on courses like 'Yoga Vidya', Peace and Conflict Study', Assamese DTP and Webdesigning' etc. 2. Establishing a 'Cultural Society' and initiating a 'Yoga Centre'. 3. Publishing a series of Books on the eminent figures of the greater Namti region (Padachihna Vol I in 2020 & Vol 2 in 2022).

4. Insisting on NSS & NCC activities. 5. Offering

NSS & Communicative Assamese as Compulsory Skill Enhancement Course in the UG level. 6. Using Assamese along with English as medium of instruction in the UG level. 7. Organizing Orientation Programme on Bodo Language in 2017, Workshop/Talk/Seminar on Assamese Language, Literature, Culture. Offering online course requires a well-equipped IT infrastructure an approval of the competent authority. As an affiliated UG college with limited autonomy, SPP College is yet to offer any Course online. But the college envisions to upgrade itself to that level in conformity with NEP recommendations. It is worthy of mention that the college has already proved its potential in this area by successfully delivering curriculum, conducting examination, taking assignments, holding webinars during the COVID and post-COVID period, by working in e-content development and establishing the College Digital Repository for extensive benefit of the learners.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome Based Education being the need of the hour, SPP College, Namti tries its level best to lay optimum focus on OBE in spite of having some bottle neck due to limitation of choosing curriculum. The college mechanism of focusing on OBE primarily involves the practices like: 1. Conducting student orientation session both at the time of admission and in the class room. 2. By providing detail syllabus to every department as part of conveying POs, PSOs, COs to the students. The same is also published in the college website for easy access of the students. 3. Organizing relevant talk, seminar, GD etc. both in the institutional and departmental level. 4. Facilitating Experiential/Experimental learning 5. Regular analysis of over all performance, progression & placement record of students, feedbacks from different stakeholders an integral part of focusing on OBE The college is well aware of the need for focusing more on OBE in compliance with NEP suggestions & recommendations and envisages in its Institutional Development Plan to garner adequate academic autonomy so that exclusive focus may be laid on Outcome Based Education within the purview of the New Education Policy.

6. Distance education/online education:

Offering Courses/Programmes in Distance or Online mode is an emerging area at present and the NEP is

also thrusting on the same. The college till date offers no Course or Programme in Distance/Online mode as the provision does not exist in the Dibrugarh University Act 1956. In spite of that, the College has already initiated certain measures in the line of Distance education/online education by: 1. Establishing SPP College Study Centre under Directorate of Distance Education, Dibrugarh University through which Post Graduate Programmes in Assamese, Sociology, Political Science & Education are offered. 2. Establishing SPP College Study Centre under Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University, through which both Under Graduate & Post graduate Programmes are offered. 3. Encouraging use of Online teaching platform 4. Upgrading the central library technologically and thereby making it accessible through online 5. Developing a Digital Repository 6. Working for academic autonomy/collaboration with other institution so that some courses can be offered in distance/online mode 7. Using different online platforms for delivering classes, taking assignments, feedback etc. At present, the college is thus preparing its ground for complying with NEP suggestions & recommendations in terms of distance education/ online education in the days to come. To make the college ready for effective NEP implementation, SPP College Task Force was constituted in 2022.

- By offering Add-On Courses on Soft Skill, Spoken English, Computer Application, Yoga Vidya, Assamese DTP, Peace and Conflict Study, Mass Communication, Mushroom Cultivation etc. to enrich students in the practical field of their lives.
- Through multiple programmes conducted under the aegis of National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), as well as in campus & outreach programmes/activities in the initiative of Women Cell, Career and Guidance Cell, IQAC, Teachers' Unit and so forth. - Students' Attendance is communicated to the students at the end of every month and also publicly displayed.
- Discussion on the evaluated scripts of the students in the class as well as in the department is mandatory.
- Constitutional provision is there for the students' right to apply for re-evaluation of the answer scripts, if any doubt remains.

S.P.P. College, Namti established in1970 to impart higher education in a region beset with educational backwardness has in its possession a total of 55 bighas 2 kathas of land divided into three separate plots-firstly, in its existing premises with 8 bighas 2 katha, secondly 2 bighas at Women Hostel Campus and thirdly, 45 bighas at Ghelong Chapori with a semi-developed football ground. The college is situated in a peaceful rural area, and the institution has been trying to provide state-of-the-art infrastructure and updated academic facilities to cope up with the ever-challenging emerging demands. The glimpse of such an institutional endeavor is well-manifested in the facilities as stated below:

Classroom Facilities:

- The college has 32 classrooms out of which one is a smart classroom-cum-computer lab and 12 are ICT enabled.
- The classrooms are sufficiently spacious, hygienic, well-ventilated, properly furnished and equipped with standard Teaching Learning Materials.
- All the departments have separate rooms for faculty and are equipped with desktop computers.
- 12 CCTV cameras are installed in the campus and in the classrooms.

Laboratory facilities:

The institution has 6 (six) laboratories in the departments of Geography, Education, Life Sciences (Botany, Zoology), Physics, Chemistry and Geology maintained by the respective departments.

Computer Facilities:

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

Response:

The SPP College is continuously upgrading its IT facility to go with this age of Information and communication technology. Every year, a reasonable amount is allotted in the College Annual Budget for the acquisition and maintenance of IT facilities in the college. During the period from 2017 to 2022, the college has strengthened its ICT infrastructure by installing classroom-related IT facilities such as:

- Installation of 10 smart TVs & 4 Projectors in the classrooms with Wi-Fi connection
- Installation of 1 Smart Classroom cum Computer Laboratory
- Broadband connection.

With the emerging ICT environment, SPP College is also aiming to achieve complete automation of the regular activities of the campus including admission, administrative and academic processes to make it time-effective and user-friendly, smart, convenient, and transparent. The SPP College library is already automated with Koha Integrated library management system in the cloud environment which facilitates-

• Computer-based Book Circulation was added in 2021

- OPAC, Web-OPAC was launched in 2021
- Digital Repository system was developed in 2022
- Digital Gate Entry Register was procured in 2022
- Ask the Librarian Service was introduced in 2022
- Service through Social Media started in 2022

ICT infrastructure and features are also utilized in the General, academic and financial administration of the college for the services like online salary, official communication, financial transaction, e-tendering, PFMS, online admission process, online registration, form fill-up, admit card issue, other teaching-learning practices, etc. The departments also make use of the e-platforms like Google Classrooms, Google Meet, Youtube, Zoom, Webex, etc. for teaching-learning practices.

The attendance of the employees has been collected through a biometric scanner since 2018. The network-connected computers are protected by antiviruses. Moreover, the college hires computer technicians and service providers at frequent intervals for the upgradation & maintenance of ICT infrastructure.

The college acquired 3 internet connecting devices (Jio-Fi) in 2018 as a tool for augmenting the IT infrastructure of the college. The Institution updated its broadband connection with BSNL since the session 2020-21. The bandwidth of the internet connection in the Institution is more than 100 MBPS.

The college website was updated in 2020 by Digi Tech Computer Centre, Sivasagar, and re-designed in 2021 by R.S. Computers, Guwahati adding new features and since then the same has been regularly updated to ensure its optimum utilization and user-friendliness.

Other ICT tools like computers, printers, scanners, DTP software, photocopy machines, etc. are also regularly procured and maintained by the college.

5.4 Alumni Engagement

SPP College, Namti has an active Alumni Association which is registered under Society's Act XXI of 1860 (Registration No. RS/SIVA/256/G/09 dated 17-06-2022 vide letter no 966). The SPP College Alumni Association has been contributing significantly to the overall development of the college in multiple ways, which ranges from financial aid to academic assistance. The following are the major areas in which the Alumni Association collaborates with the college administration.

- Financial Assistance: The Alumni Association contributed to the college an amount of more than 8 Lakhs during the last five years. The donation of the alumni is valued in different forms, viz., books to both central and departmental, almirah for books, Sound system, desks and table for departmental library, laboratory equipment for practical works like tracing table along with lighting facility, wall clocks for all the departments, photo frames with photographs for showcasing different departmental activities. An outstanding contribution in this regard has been made by Mr. Lachit Phukan, an alumni of the college who have generously donated the entire expense of the main entrance gate and arch of the college estimating around 5 lacs in the fond memory of his father, Late Indra Phukan.
- Academic Assistance: Academic assistance are sought from the eligible Alumni, both offline and online, by various departments in respect of classes as visiting lecturers, motivational and popular talks and so forth.
- Alumni Engagement Policy: To maintain a healthy realationship with the passed out students, college have an alumni engagement policy by involving the college alumni in outreach programmes like social awareness programmes, cleanliness drive of public places and historical monuments and youth sensitization programmes underlaken by the college authority in the surrounded areas of the college.
- Alumni Meet: By convention, each year the college organises a genral meet where the alumni of the college interact with the present students by providing inputs and share their experience regarding skills, recent technologies and in applying knowledge in various fields.

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6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Strategic plans are based on the vision and mission of the institute which gives right direction and helps in the attainment of the institutional goals and objectives. The college has formulated its own **Institutional Development Plan (IDP)** which reflects both short term and long term goals and objectives. U.G.C. Act, 1956. The college has two-tier system of governance. At the administrative level, the Governing Body (GB) is at the apex. At the college level, the Principal is at the apex of the internal administration.

Administrative Setup and Functionality of Institutional bodies:

Vice Principal: As the Academic Officer and Chairperson of Academic Council supervises the academic practices and frames relevant plans/schedules and policies in consultation with the Principal, HoDs, Faculty, Librarian and others.

Head of the Departments: Take the responsibility of heading all administrative and academic affairs of the departments as well as of the college.

IQAC: I QAC is the guiding force in various strategies for quality improvement and assurance related activities. Many of the quality improvement related decisions were taken at different meetings held by the IQAC with the staff.

Library Committee and the Librarian: The Library Committee and the Librarian are responsible for framing policy, administering and managing the Library.

At the end of each Financial Year, profit on interest & dividend are proportionately distributed among the members. When a membership expires, a special gift amount (Rs. 15000/- at present) along with the deposited amount is paid to the employees. Financial discipline is maintained by conducting Internal and external Audit every year.
- **First Aid & Health Care Policy**: SPP College has a Policy for first aid & health care. Besides providing first aid, sick -bed, oxygen container in the college premises, the college fraternity further extends helping hand to needy members by providing financial & moral support.
- Sanitary Pad Vending Machine: The institution has installed a sanitary pad vending machine for female employees and girl students.
- **Divyagnajan Policy**: SPP College has framed its policy for differently able stakeholder under which amenities like wheel- chairs, ramp, restroom, scribe etc. are provided to such stakeholders.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Utilization of resources: The College has a distinct policy and transparent mechanism for ensuring optimum use of the resources. The same is done by adhering to the guidelines fixed by the granting authority/agency, constituting different relevant committees, inviting tenders against different works, publishing in college website, using e-platforms like online tendering, PFMS, e-transaction, minimizing cash transaction etc.

Strategy for financial audits

The college undertakes initiatives to conduct both external and internal audit. External audit for grants received from the University Grant Commission(UGC), Rastriya Ucchatar Siksha Abhiya(RUSA), Government of Assam is conducted by the government auditor. Internal audit for grants received from NSS, ICSSR, Red Ribbon Club is done by Sunil Agarwala, Amulapotty, Sivasagar registered chartered accountant. The accounts and related expenditure records—are initially submitted to the chartered accountant. The audit report issued by the chartered accountant with utilization—certificate and all necessary ratified accounts is submitted to the competent authorities. Apart from it the college authority appoints internal auditors to conduct other financial audits for the following funds-

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1. Title: Environmental Practices.

- Objectives:
- 1. To create eco-friendly learning and working environment.

- **Context:** At the backdrop of sheer environmental problems, excelling in the area of environmental preservation & protection has become a priority concern for SPP College, Namti, which the institution is committed to address through its multi-dimensional environmental practices.
- Practice:

- 1. For the maintenance of Eco- friendly campus, **plantation programme** under the aegis of NSS and NCC has been made an indispensable part of the college activities.
- 2. The college **Free Admission Policy** for BPL students **mandatorily includes** planting of sapling and its nurturing by the beneficiary.
- 3. The college has framed a **green campus policy, in compliancee** with which multiple practices have been made in and outside the campus for promoting sustainability and eco-friendliness.
- 4. Green Audit was conducted in 2022 to assess the green initiatives and their implementation.
- 5. **Wetland Preservation:** College has preserved one Wetland area spreading over 3600 sq. ft. attached to its campus. Besides the native ones, some migratory birds are also seen during the month of February and March.
- 6. College endeavours to sensitize the students on environmental issues by regularly observing World Environment Day, Wetland day, Ozone Day and other days of relevance.
- 7. For due management of various wastes, the college has adopted a **Waste Management policy**, which is strictly adhered to while disposing both degradable and non-degradable waste.
- 8. The college has initiated a **rain- water harvesting** system in small scale primarily for gardening purpose.
- 9. **Alternative Energy:** As an integral part of the environmental practices, the college has installed 10 Solar Panel Lights and LED lights.
- 10. For reducing energy intensity, the college got its **Energy Audit** done by the Department of Energy Engineering, NEHU, Shillong on 24th to 27th March, 2022.
- 11. One Day Woprkshop on Energy Management and Accounting was conducted on 24-3-2022.
- 12. **Soil Testing:** Soil samples were collected from four different locations of the college and analyzed for the basic parameters while carrying out the green audit in the college.
- 13. The college maintains its campus as a **Plastic Free Zone.**

• Evidence of Success:

Problems encountered & resources required: Against the mega-environmental issues like deforestation, global warming, pollution & over-population, the effort from the college proves meagre and this poses major problem encountered in the process. To overcome the same, a holistic effort is required with sufficient inclusion and involvement of human, technological and financial resources.

2. WORKING TOWARDS HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT OF GIRL STUDENTS & GENDER PARITY:

- **Context**: To motivate & facilitate the girl students of the greater locality and beyond towards pursuing higher education & self empowerment, which strobgly reflects the institutional commitment towards inclusiveness and social uplift.
- **Practice**: Since inception, Swahid Peoli Phukan College, Namti has been able to provide a special platform for girl students, majority of whom would have otherwise remained deprived of higher education due to socio-economic condition or geographical remoteness. This institutional commitment essentially reiterates the tenets of the national flagship initiative of '*Beti Pardhao*, *Beti*

Bachao'. Till date, the college has succeeded in creating new avenues for attracting girl students towards higher education, which about 70% enrolment status of girl students appropriately reflects. To achieve the coveted goal, the college adopts an effective mechanism based on the following pillars:

- 1. **Scholarships:** The college facilitates the girl students for availing freeship, fee concession, different govt. & non-govt. scholarships including *Ishan Uday*. 90% of the deserving girl students have been benefited from such schemes.
- 2. **Equity**: The College upholds the principle of 'Equal Opportunity to All' with emphasis on equal representation, participation and co-existence, which is well-manifested in all levels of institutional practices. In compliance with this principle, provision is kept for Girls' Office Bearers in the Students' Union, compulsory inclusion of girls in NSS, NCC and other institutional bodies with student representatives. The college has even a special NCC Girls' Army Unit containing 54 Cadets with one Associate NCC Officer Lt. Dr. Beejata Das, Asst. Prof., Geography.
- 3. **Empowerment**: The College provides extensive opportunity and conducts multiple programmes related to girls' holistic empowerment, inclusiveness and health & hygiene. Besides these, the college Gymnasium has contributed a lot in the direction of girls' empowerment, which is well reflected in producing sports persons of national and international standard such as
- 4. **Safety & Security**: The College ensures a transparent and impartial outlook in designing and promulgating Gender Policy, Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaint Committee (ICC), College Women Cell & Anti-ragging Cell. Measures are taken for uninterrupted power supply and installation of CC cameras in the campus.
- 5. **Regular Assessment & Outcome**: The College ensures true implementation of its policies through strict monitoring and regular assessment of the outcome.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Heading towards Multidisciplinarity:

SPP College, Namti started its journey in 1979 purely as an Arts College with 8 nos. of departments namely Assamese, Economics, Education, English, Geography, History, Political Science and Sociology. But in conjunction with the contemporary needs in the changing scenario, the college is now striving for adopting a comprehensive multi-disciplinary approach with the objective of meeting the students' requirement and at the same time, preparing ground for effective NEP implementation. As such, the college is now consolidating its focus on garnering multidisciplinarity as one distinctive area of priority and thrust. In spite of the effort being recent, the substantial progress in this direction is well-reflected in the following result-giving practices that the college has already initiated:

- 1. Science Stream: SPP College enthusiastically introduced Science Stream at its own initiative with three primary objectives:
 - to give momentum to the institution's much-coveted multi-disciplinary approach.
 - to contribute to the cause of encouraging science education.
 - to cater to the needs of such aspirants, who might have otherwise remained deprived due to their incapable financial condition.

Science Stream was introduced in 2012 with temporary approval from Dibrugarh University for four subjects- Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology and later for Geology in 2013 as B.Sc. Non-major/Non-honours course. Since inception, the college has been trying relentlessly to develop required infrastructure, installation of laboratory, procurement of laboratory equipments & materials for effective running of the programme. Progress has further been made by getting approval from Dibrugarh University for doing B.Sc. with major/honours in Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Mathematics, Economics and Geography. This is to be highlighted that introduction of Science Stream is the urge of the hour from students' perspective as well as at the backdrop of financial backwardness & institutional remoteness to study science in the UG level.

• During the last five years from 2017-18 to 2021-22, this stream has proved its potential by

- maintaining good academic record with average pass percentage of 79.5 and progression rate of 85.88% through passed-out students' pursuance of courses like M. Sc., B.Ed, Nursing & Paramedical, Diploma in Engineering, Agricultural Sciences etc. The passed out stuents have also been able to maintain a satisfactory placement record of 28% (approximately).
- Four nucleotide sequence of Aedes done by Dr. Sangeeta Boruah, Assistant Professor, Department of Zoology in 2015 was sequenced and submitted to GenBank and is now available to EMBL in Europe and the DNA data Bank of Japan.
- Jiji P, Assistant Professor, Department of Botany, won the RULA International Innovation and Betterment Award 2018 for her research paper "Phytodiversity assessment of Sola Reserve Forest, Charaideo District, Assam, India"
- Shri Abhijit Sensua, an erstwhile student of 6th Sem, Department of Zoology, could include his name in the International Book of Records in 2020 by obtaining maximum number of Online Certificates of Webinar participation.
- A village science fair was organized by Assam Science Society in association with Swahid Peoli Phukan College on 26- 27 April, 2022 to create awareness about development of science and technology in rural area.
- 2. **Skill-based Courses:** Introduction of **8 nos. of Add on Courses**, which are exclusively skiil or value-based, marks the beginning of a new era in terms of the institution's adoptability intent and potentiality for future sustenance. Starting from course planning to syllabus framing, everything has been designed by the departments concerned and more than 160 students have been benefitted from these courses in a very short span of time. Besides these courses, the Yoga Centre, the College Cultural Society, the well-equipped Gymnasium, the college-run Pubali Art School have also added to the multidisciplinary approach of the college. The College Computer Laboratory, ICT infrastructure including the Digital Repository & formation of College IIC have also added to the required infrastructure & ambience for actualizing the multidisciplinarian approach. The college envisions to introduce more number of skill-based courses in near future depending on utility, demand and feasibility which is clearly stated in the Institutional Development Plan of the college.
- 3. Overcoming the limitation of a traditional UG college, SPP College, Namti has also enhanced its scope towards multi-disciplinarity by offering NSS, Rural Development, Environmental Science etc. as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course, Skill Enhancement Course & Generic Elective Course. It has been done by capitalizing optimally on the limited scope provided in the prescribed UG curriculum. Moreover, in conjunction with the syllabi of certain Courses, maximum opportunity has been provided to the learners to get themselves skilled in different domains through experiential learning like conducting survey, undertaking project work/field study/educational tour and preparing report on that, giving exposure to the students by motivating them for role-play both inside and outside the class room, by making extensive use of ICT, creating expertise through Teachers' participation in STC and STT on Soft skill, Life Skill, Computing Skill etc. It is worthy of mention that two senior faculty members of the college Dr. Nilakshi Puhkan Borgohain and Dr. Tanuja Bora obtained Ph.D. on areas related to Performing Art and rendered service as Resource Person at the Centre of Performing Art, Dibrugarh University (link: https://sppcollege.in/faculty.php?fid=147). Besides this, the college was registered under National Skill Development Corporation, Govt. of India in 2021 for introducing Skill-based Courses under the Scheme of PM Koushal Vikash Yojana.

Future Plan: Introduction of new skill-based courses on the demanding areas like tea-management, agarwood, beautician, knitting & designing, nursery etc. so that even an Arts Graduate can acquire adequate knowledge on management or entrepreneurship; similarly, a Science Graduate gets acquainted with the required knowledge of History, Political Science or Indian Value System. The sole objective is to create

maximum opportunity for the learners by extensively enriching the institutional multi-disciplinary avenues. It is expected that implementation of NEP shall be a great booster in this dimension.

• SPP College, Namti nurtures the dream of moulding itself as a much-coveted hub for the upcoming generations to pursue higher education of the global standard. Chasing this cherished dream, the college fraternity has been strategically working for the attainment of more comprehensive multidisciplinarity and the afore-stated practices are some landmark initiatives towards it.
